## **Jobs to do in the garden**

- Cut down deciduous ornamental grasses left standing over winter, before fresh shoots appear
- Divide large clumps of snowdrops and winter aconites after flowering and replant to start new colonies
- Lawns – Now is a good time to spike the lawn while it is rather damp. As soon as we get a dry spell then is the time to scarify lawns. After this, now is the time to re-seed any bare patches or where necessary.
- Cut back wisteria side shoots to three buds from the base, to encourage abundant flowers in spring
- Prune buddleia and elder to the base to keep these vigorous shrubs to a reasonable size
- With spring around the corner, February is the ideal time to prepare your allotment for some of the earliest outdoor sowings in March.
- As well as the jobs listed above there are plenty of indoor sowings you can start now, before transferring to the allotment later in the year. This includes sowing tomatoes, globe artichokes and sprouting broccoli in a propagator, while Brussels sprouts, Parsnips, Leeks & Onions and spinach can all be sown under cover.
- Possible idea. As you know we have all been delivered a new General Waste Bins. If you do not need it, yes you can send it back, or alternatively you could always use it as a new water butt.
